Colonoscopy

Colonoscopy is an exam using a small tube called a colonoscope. The colonoscope has a light and camera at the very end.

colon = large intestine
oscopy = to look with a scope

The camera lets your doctor see the inside lining of the:

- rectum
- colon
- sometimes the last part of small intestine called "terminal ileum".

The colonoscopy helps us find bleeding, infection, ulcers, polyps, or inflammation.

We may take very small tissue samples called biopsies. A pathologist looks at the tissue and can identify certain diseases. The pathologist reports the biopsy to your doctor. Your clinic nurse calls you with results, usually within 7-10 business days after the test.

Before colonoscopy

- Tell your doctor about all medicines you take. It may be necessary to take routine medicines at different times.
- Call your doctor immediately if you have a fever of 101.5 or greater.

Bowel Prep

You will take medicine called a bowel prep to clean out the colon. <u>Please call your doctor immediately</u>, if for any reason you cannot complete the bowel prep as directed.

Permit for procedure

Although complications are rare, certain risks are present. Risks for a colonoscopy:

- Perforation: Any instrument looking inside the body, can cause a small hole or tear. Since we are looking at the inside of the rectum, colon, and terminal ilium, a small hole or tear can happen in this area.
- General Anesthesia: Colonoscopy requires general anesthesia. Information is given to you in the pre-op and post-op areas.
- Aspiration Pneumonia: This happens if a small amount of stomach fluid enters the lungs. An empty stomach before the procedure will decrease the likelihood of this happening.
- **4. Bleeding:** Blood loss from colonoscopy, even with biopsies, is very slight averaging only a few drops.

We will answer all your questions about a colonoscopy.

Before you sign a **Consent for Procedure** form you need to know:

- 1. What a colonoscopy is.
- 2. Possible risks.
- 3. Why we are doing the colonoscopy.

Waiting room

- Parents stay in the waiting area during the colonoscopy. One parent must stay in the waiting room during this procedure.
- A colonoscopy takes about 1 hour to complete.

After colonoscopy

- You go to recovery room and stay on IV fluids and monitors until you wake up.
- While you are in recovery room, your doctor reviews the procedure with your family and explains the colonoscopy pictures.
- Your will receive home care information while you are waking up.
