Neurosciences Social Worker



As the Neurosciences Social Worker, my job is to help families and assist with any barriers to healthcare. Social workers help advocate for patient's when they do not receive the services they so desperately need. I often assist with insurance issues and ensure that patients receive the correct services at school and have access to available resources. I often ask myself, is this child receiving all the benefits and services that are available to them? As a clinical social worker I do my best to stay knowledgeable of community resources, programs, and government policies that affect your child's care. A social worker can also help families with coordinating the care of their child. Many of our patients have complicated medical conditions, which can make daily life challenging. Social workers are here to listen, offer support, and ensure that patients and families thrive, not just survive.

Social workers view patients not as an illness or diagnosis, but rather as a whole person. A social worker understands that there is so much more to a patient's life than an annual neurology visit. How does this illness or condition affect their friendships at school or relationships with family members at home? Does this

patient need extra support to be successful and happy? Many times, social workers can provide brief counseling and assessment to determine a family's needs, and connect them with other professionals who can provide ongoing therapy and support.

Every patient situation is unique. One day I might assist a refugee family from a war torn country locate basic services, the next I may meet with a local middle class family who is overwhelmed with their child's care. The goal of a social worker is to enhance human well-being and help meet the basic human needs of all people. I often tell families that if there is an issue or problem, a social worker can help. I may not have all the answers, but I will always do my best to point you in the right direction.

HOT TOPIC: CONCUSSION AWARENESS

Awareness regarding the potential negative effects of concussion has increased in recent years, and we continue to learn more about the best ways to support recovery following a concussion. A concussion can be very serious, but when given appropriate treatment, most people with concussions recover just fine. If you

suspect a concussion, it's very important to contact your physician's office and follow steps designed for your child's condition.

Recovery typically occurs within hours to a few days. Here are some general guidelines:

- Head injuries in children are common and often very mild
- ♦ Concussions are serious because their symptoms can get worse
- It is rare to have the very serious type of head injury
- Recovery from concussions should be monitored because symptoms can get worse

Cook Children's will create a plan to help your child recover from a concussion with the goal to speed recovery and prevent further injury.
